MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

There have been some important transitions in our Department this past year. In 2019, Drs. Pam Fink and Ed Clark retired from our faculty. We enjoyed celebrating their contributions over the years as we bid them farewell. We also welcomed a new Assistant Professor, Dr. Elia Tait-Wojno, to our faculty this past August (see opposite column). This is a very exciting recruitment for us; Elia brought a vibrant research program with her that she had initiated at Cornell and is already establishing collaborations with new colleagues in Seattle studying helminth infection and allergic

disease. She also brought her enthusiasm and energy for issues of diversity and inclusion, and now chairs our newly formed Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee (see next page). Despite the retirement of two of our senior colleagues, increases in grant funding to our primary faculty allowed our overall grant portfolio to hold steady at ~\$21 million in FY 2019. We expect these funds to increase over the next year as our programs continue to grow, and new collaborations facilitate funding for large projects. We are excited at the launch of a new Program on Maternal-Fetal Health within the Center for Innate Immunity and Immune Disease (CIIID, ciiid.uw.edu) that was enabled by collaborations between Dr. Michael Gale Jr. (Professor, Immunology and CIIID Director) and Dr. Kristina Adams Waldorf (Professor, Ob/Gyn). Drs. Gale and Adams Waldorf received almost \$19 million in NIH grants that helped launch this new program. Dr. Gale and Dr. Michael Gerner (Assistant Professor, Immunology) are also key collaborators in a new "IMPAc-TB" NIH contract awarded to Dr. Kevin Urdahl at SCRI (Adjunct Professor, Immunology) to study the immune response to tuberculosis. Our graduate program also continues to thrive. We are grateful to the Immunology Department alumni who participated in our "Careers in Immunology" events that allow our current students to interact with prior graduate students and postdocs and learn about their diverse career paths. We are continuing our efforts to increase philanthropy for the department, especially in ways that will enhance our training programs. Our Fund for Excellence supports many activities for students and postdocs. Our endowed Dr. Richard Titus Fund for Graduate Student Support generates funds to support a student every other year; we are hoping to increase this fund to support a student fellowship each year. Please consider making a contribution to make a difference in the future of science, immunology and lives of students. Elia Tait Wojno, PhD Assistant Professor

In August 2019, Dr. Elia Tait Wojno joined the Department of Immunology as an Assistant Professor. She along with two lab members, postdoc Lauren Webb, and Graduate Student Bola Oyesola made the long trek across the country from Cornell University to join us in Seattle. Dr. Tait Wojno graduated with a B.A. in Biology from Drew University. She received her Ph.D. in 2011 from the University of Pennsylvania, completing her thesis work with Dr. Chris Hunter. She completed postdoctoral training with Dr. David Artis at the University of Pennsylvania and Weill Cornell

Medicine. Dr. Tait Wojno went on to establish her own laboratory as an Assistant Professor of Immunology at the Baker Institute for Animal Health and Department of Microbiology and Immunology at Cornell College of Veterinary Medicine in 2015. Her research program focuses on Type 2 inflammation during helminth infection and allergy with an emphasis on studying the crosstalk between cytokines, lipids and cell/cell interactions in mucosal tissues. She has quickly settled her lab on the 5th floor of our building in South Lake Union and begun serving as the Chair of our new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee. Welcome Elia!


